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


BEAD Success to Date





Illinois is required to connect 175,293 locations through BEAD



Broadband service availability in Illinois, per BEAD-eligibility data

~4.2M

Total Broadband Serviceable Locations (BSLs)

~107K (~3%) Unserved BSLs (locations with <25/3Mbps speed)

~172K BEADeligible BSLs

~65K (~1%)

Underserved BSLs (locations with ≥25/3Mbps and <100/20Mbps speed)


Plus **3,356** eligible community anchor institutions (CAIs)

~4.0M (~96%)


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Illinois received 238 applications covering 86% of eligible locations statewide and 85% of hard-to-serve project area units (PAUs) in Wave 1

Wave 1 application summary

238

Illinois received applications for...

5,615 (76% of total) Regular PAUs

• **1,582** (85% of total) Hard-to-serve PAUs

Totaling... ~151K (86% of total) Locations

- Regular PAUs with 1+ bids
- Hard-to-serve PAUs with 1+ bids
- PAUs that received 0 bids

Risks to the BEAD Program





Federal proposals could add 1-2 years to BEAD

Currently, Illinois' BEAD-funded Connect IL Round 4 is proceeding as planned.

However, two federal bodies have proposed changes that could **delay Illinois' BEAD deployment by up to two years:**

- 1. Policy changes floated by the U.S. Department of Commerce through a rigorous review of the program
- 2. HR1870 SPEED for BEAD Act introduced in the U.S. House of Representatives



What could lead to 1-2 years in delays?

Proposed Wholesale Programmatic Changes

Including changes to...

- Technology requirements
- Labor policy (as a part of scoring criteria)
- Low-cost service option



Such wholesale programmatic changes could require the Office of Broadband to...

- Revise state rules
- Revise Initial Proposal VII
- Re-run Challenge Process
- Revise Connect Illinois Round 4 NOFO
- Re-run Sub-Grantee
 Selection Process

Timeline Repercussions



In total, re-completing these process steps could delay shovels in the ground by up to two years

The BEAD Program is not perfect – yet, making wholesale changes at this point will only add -- not save – time and costs.



Next Steps

- Understand the status of your states' BEAD program and share the momentum and success of to date in Illinois, it's working as planned!
- Encourage the U.S. Department of Commerce and NTIA to:
 - (1) Avoid wholesale BEAD Program changes that would delay implementation
 - (2) Leave technology decisions up to states

Advocate that NTIA should preserve state autonomy so states can implement the program in a way that's best for our communities.

Connect Illinois Round 4 Progress Update Broadband Equity, Access, and Deployment (BEAD) Program



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Connecting 175K homes & businesses through BEAD

Illinois has been allocated \$1.04 billion to bring high-speed internet access to ~175,000 households, small businesses, and community anchor institutions. Eligible locations are those that do not have access to least 100/20 Mbps broadband speeds today.

Illinois is carrying out a three-wave competitive selection process. Wave 1, which required fiber applications with a share of 'hard-to-serve' areas, will be completed in May.

Wave 1: 238 applications covering 86% of the state


Geographic coverage: Received 238 applications from 26 providers proposing to cover 86% of state, including 85% of areas deemed 'hard to serve'



Matching funds: Internet service providers put forth nearly \$887M in matching funds



Technology: An overwhelming majority of applications in Wave 1 propose using fiber technology. Fiber is scalable, reliable, and a long-term investment in a community



Community support: 90% of applications included evidence of community support such as letters, community plans, and other engagement with local governments, institutions, and residents

Connecting 175K homes and businesses to high-speed internet

Illinois has been allocated \$1.04 billion to bring broadband access to ~175,000 households, small businesses, and community anchor institutions without 100/20 mbps internet.

Illinois is carrying out a three-wave competitive selection process. Wave 1, which requires fiber technology with a share of 'hard to serve' areas, will conclude in early May.

Wave 1: 238 applications covering 86% of the state

of hard-to-serve project areas 85% covered

of Illinois locations covered by all-66% fiber proposals

of applications have documented 90% community support

in matching funds from internet \$887M service providers

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Early 2025 - Wave 1: Fiber applications and a share of 'hard- to-serve' areas

Spring/Summer 2025 - Wave 2: Invites applications from all reliable broadband technologies

Fall 2025 - Optional Wave 3 and announcement of final awards

Early 2026 - Broadband deployment begins
